A - Quantitative Evidence

This is evidence which is numerical and should include the number people who use the service and the number of people from the protected characteristic groups who might be affected by changes to the service.

Falkirk Central Locality has the smallest population (44,107) than other three Locality areas but in a smaller, confined space and is expected to increase to 44,637 by 2028. Below is a breakdown of the protected characteristics and data available for each one in relation to the development of the Falkirk Central Locality Plan. Date has been taken from Falkirk overall and where possible specific central data has been outlined.

Age

20% of Falkirk Central Population are aged over 65 and from 2016-2021 there was over a 10% increase in the 85+ population and a decrease in age 0-4 years. (Locality profile, p7).

From the 2022 census, 17,106 individuals aged 65 and over identified themselves as disabled which is the largest age group within Falkirk.

From 2019-2021, deaths between 15-44 was 161 per 100,000 which was higher than other Falkirk HSCP Locality areas and Scotland (Locality Profile, page 15)

Research by OFCOM in 2022 found that 26% of people aged 75+ did not have internet access at home (compared to an average of 6% for all adults aged 18+). From a Falkirk perspective, Consultation from the <u>Equality Outcomes & Mainstreaming Report</u> identified that 42.1% of respondents believed they were digitally excluded.

OFCOM also found that being older, living alone and having a limiting long-term condition increased the chances of somebody being digitally excluded. OFGEM notes that 'Among those living alone who were also aged 70 and over, more than half said they didn't use the internet or have access to the internet at home (53%). This proportion rose to 60% for people who lived alone, were aged 70+ and had an impacting or limiting condition.'

Disability

In the 2022 Census, 38,953 people in Falkirk described themselves as disabled. This equates to 24.4% of the population.

Although not specific to Falkirk Central, The 2019 Learning Disability Scotland publication notes that 691 adults with learning disabilities are known to local authorities in Falkirk. This equates to 5.2 people with a learning disability per 1,000 people in the general population, which is the same as the Scotland rate.

Again, there is limited data regarding physical disability for Falkirk overall however in the 2011 census there were over 10,8000 people recorded in Falkirk as having a physical disability which is 7% of the population. In 2010, 3.1 were registered blind per 1,000 in Falkirk and 5.8 per 1,000 were visually impaired.

22.2% of Falkirk Central population has a long-term condition which is a higher rate than other Localities and is around 9,000 people in the Central Locality.

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32.5% individuals over 65 in Falkirk Central have two or more conditions. (Locality profile, page 18.)

In 2023/2024, Falkirk & Clackmannanshire Carers Centre received 41% of referrals from Central Locality from carers whose cared for person condition was a physical disability.

Sex

Population for Falkirk Central is split between 49.3% male and 50.7% female. There is a broadly similar split between age bands for male and female, with the highest percentage for both in the 18-44 and 45-54 age group. (Locality Profile, p6.)

Life expectancy in Falkirk Central is lower than other Locality areas in Scotland. Male Life expectancy is 75.1 Female is 78.8 with life expectancy age decreasing gradually over the last 10 years. (Locality Profile, p15)

Third sector and public sector organisations that deliver specialist Violence against Women and Girl's support/services across Falkirk have received a total of 170 referrals for Domestic Abuse during 2023/24. Unfortunately, this data is not available for Falkirk Central specific. (2023/24 GBVG Data return)

Ethnicity

2022 Census had 86.74% of respondents in Falkirk identified as white Scottish. The largest non-white ethnic groups were Asian, Asian Scottish and Asian British at 2.05%. and the largest ethnic group was Pakistani, Pakistani Scottish or Pakistanis British at 1.13%.

<u>Equality Outcomes & Mainstreaming Report</u> consultation for Falkirk highlighted that 39.5% of respondents believed they were adversely impacted by language and cultural barriers when accessing health and social care services.

Religion/Belief/non-belief

The 2022 Census was the first time that no religion received the highest response from a census at 51.1%. Within Falkirk overall, 54.53% said that they had no religion, and the largest religious group was "Church of Scotland" at 22.7%. The next largest religious groups were 'Roman Catholic' (11.07%), 'Other Christian' (4.03%) and 'Muslim' (1.3%).

Transgender

The 2022 Scottish Census was the first to ask people in Scotland to voluntarily declare their sexuality and gender identity. In Falkirk, 4,024 were LGB+ with 3% aged 16 and over. 429 people in Falkirk were trans or had trans history, 0.33% of the population. 38.6% of those were aged 16 to 24.

Poverty

In 2021, 32.3% of people in Falkirk Central lived in the most deprived SIMD Quintiles which is an increase in 3.3% from 2016. This is significantly higher than Falkirk HSCP overall and Scotland which is 15.9% and 20% respectively (Locality Profile, p3). Only 17.7% of the population live in the least deprived SIMD quintile. (Locality Profile, p8)

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Across Forth Valley, mortality rate for suicide is 29.3% in SIMD1 areas.

Other: Mental Health Harms

In, 2021/2022, 22.1% of people were prescribed medication for Anxiety, depression & psychosis which is a 26.8% increase in the last ten years and higher than Falkirk HSCP and Scotland. (Locality Profile, 2021) <u>FDAMH</u> received 4438 referrals across all services from 2023/2024 within Falkirk with an age range of clients from 18-94 and In 2023 there were 27 deaths due to Suicide in Falkirk.

Social - case studies; personal / group feedback / other

Age

Respondents to the <u>Equality Outcome & Mainstreaming Report</u> suggested that older people did not know where to find information online or are able to access it without support from family or friends. During consultation & engagement work to develop the plan there was a request to highlight older people and over 65's as a separate group to ensure targeted support is available for them.

Disability

Engagement for the <u>Falkirk Learning Disability Strategy</u> outlined the desire for individuals with learning disabilities across Falkirk to live independently with choice and control in their life. Carers also outline their frustration in constantly having to fight for support for their cared for person and the difficulty they have finding information and support.

Sensory impairment includes varying degrees of hearing loss, sight loss and loss of both of these senses. Unfortunately, data on prevalence of sensory impairment is very limited. A register of blindness and partial sightedness (Registered Blind and Partially Sighted Statistics – Scottish Government) was collected at a local authority level until 2010 but has since been discontinued. (SP EPIA) During consultation & engagement, it was highlighted to consider accessing to services and information for those individuals with sensory impairment.

Ethnicity

Respondents to the <u>Equality Outcome & Mainstreaming Report</u> suggested individuals often rely on friends or family members to translate for them, finding it difficult to make an appointment and no translation support offered in mental health & wellbeing services.

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Poverty

During engagement and consultation, poverty was highlighted as a concern for individuals within particular areas across Falkirk Central. It was highlighted a lack of community-based services available in Central and people have to go out with the area to access community support. However, due to cost of travel this is not always an option for individual. Anti-social behaviour was also highlighted as a concern for impacting individuals health & wellbeing.

Other- Mental Health Harms:

Individuals in Falkirk Central raised concern on the rising Drug use within <u>Bainsford & Langlees</u> and the need to tackle it. Social Issues, for example addictions, was the second greatest concern respondents had in the <u>Camelon Action Plan</u>.

Although not specific to Falkirk Central, engagement undertaken within Falkirk HSCP over the last year has outlined issues service users having access to service, transport, stigma & mental health & wellbeing.

Social media and core campaigns have been undertaken across Falkirk to improve public awareness for mental health improvement and early intervention.

In 2023 there was an <u>increase in Social media and core campaigns</u> across Falkirk to improve public awareness for mental health improvement and early intervention.

In 2023, A Trauma Informed Policy Officer was recruited to support Scottish Governments ambition for all services to be trauma informed and responsive. There is currently a pledge in Falkirk to put trauma-informed and responsive practice in place across our workforce and services and reduce barriers to those affected by trauma.

Other- Health

Three of the most common conditions in over 65's within Falkirk Central are arthritis, cancer and coronary heart disease.

There is currently 7 number of Community Link Workers based in Central Locality. Around 363 Individuals have been referred in Falkirk Central within 2024.

The most common reason for referral to the Community Link Work Service are Mental health, Social Isolation & Loneliness & Housing.

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Other: Access to Services

Respondents to <u>Camelon Action Plan</u> raised their frustration in meaningful engagement with local people and feel like it is just token gestures.

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Poverty		The Plan will have a positive impact on this protected characteristic. Poverty is one of the social determinants of health with people living in more deprived circumstances more likely to have poor health outcomes. Data for Falkirk Central highlights the health inequalities within Falkirk Central and it has the highest rate of individuals living in the most deprived areas in Falkirk. By having a guiding principle which focuses on addressing health & social inequalities, it will ensure poverty is underpinned in all work undertaken so the lives of those impacted by this protected characteristic is improved. This will also include actions within the plan to work closely with our Community Planning Partners and Fairer Falkirk team to identify solutions and support to help with the health & wellbeing of those in our most deprived areas, which in Falkirk Central is the highest. Data highlights the impact poverty can have on individuals mental health and wellbeing. Ares of poverty also align with higher substance use which has resulted in the priority for Mental Harms Hams and supporting Recovery being developed to incorporate both themes to ensure they are considered together and not in silo. The plan will ensure that campaigns currently ongoing are promoted through the Locality team to ensure a wider reach to individuals across the Locality. The plan also aims to improve knowledge of staff to support signposting individuals to additional support available which can help towards them themes that can contribute to poverty and the impact this has on individuals.

	Engagement also highlighted the issues with waiting list for mental health referrals. Although this issue a wider system concern and not specific to the central Locality, the locality plan aims to promote alternative support available to individuals to support with their mental health & wellbeing and can hopefully prove a preventive measure from their condition worsening. This includes working with partners to build capacity in central Locality to support individuals with their mental health & wellbeing, promoting alternative measures to individuals and improving signposting from operational staff.
	By viewing additional factors together, it will support with Falkirk HSCP's pledge towards trauma informed responsive practice. By understanding some of the root causes towards mental health & wellbeing their will begin to be a greater understanding and reasoning within the Locality about how individuals mental health & wellbeing is affected and ensure the most suitable support is offered ad provided. Trauma informed is also a guiding principle and is important trauma informed approaches begin to be embedded within the Localities work.
	The plan will support with acting upon measures, such as campaigns and promotion of public awareness messages to encourage improvement with mental health harms and early intervention.
